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LAUMEIER SCULPTURE PARK ANNOUNCES FALL 2023 EXHIBITION, VAUGHN DAVIS JR.: THE FABRIC OF OUR TIME

and expressive canvases that create organic, formless, shape-shifting objects, teetering between painting, performance, and sculpture.

Davis's work is timely and powerful as his distress of materials refers to daily struggles and social protest, especially for Black and Brown communities. His work challenges traditional definitions of sculpture and meditates on the passage of time

and change.

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Laumeier Sculpture Park presents first solo museum exhibition for local artist Vaughn Davis Jr.

St. Louis, MO – Laumeier Sculpture Park will present the first solo museum exhibition for St. Louis-based artist Vaughn Davis Jr., titled *The Fabric of Our Time*. The exhibition will be on view August 26 - December 17, 2023 and will feature recent and newly commissioned paintings, ceramics, and flags. The indoor and outdoor works will be presented in the Aronson Fine Arts Center's Whitaker Foundation Gallery and in the Park's Northern Grove.

Vaughn Davis Jr. rips, tears, and drapes pigmented canvases to transcend traditional notions of painting and push them into the realm of shape-shifting objects. His distress of materials refers to daily struggles and social protest, especially for Black and Brown communities. The pieces featured in the exhibition explore Davis' visual vocabulary of dismantling the picture plane, illustrating the performative nature of painting, and testing its boundaries as moments cross into sculpture.

In each of his sizable paintings the canvas has multiple expressions of manipulations–from spilled paint to soaked dye and fraying–creating a spectacle of actions Davis has enacted on the materials.

He explains: "The act of tearing my paintings has become an experience that is a protest to the formalisms of painting and a metaphor of change. When undoing threads of painted canvas, I think of borrowing tools of labor and undoing a labored object, a kind of homage to hard working people. The departure of the works on view at Laumeier is a personal one, but also to speak about the human experience. I think about the struggles of humanity and the beauty that still exists."

Davis applies a similar tactile approach in his ceramic works, folding and splitting clay and using expressive glaze techniques. Davis' clay works will be experienced as a sculptural wall installation, each perched on a series of towers, reflecting his interest in support structures such as shelves and pedestals as display mechanisms. Many of these ceramic pieces were made by Davis at the Park using Laumeier's clay studio and kilns.

In additional to the artwork presented inside the Aronson Fine Arts Center, Davis will create a series of flags for the Northern Grove Flag Project. Like his paintings, Davis' handmade, expressive flags will be made with painted fabric that is deconstructed and then reconstructed. With these site-responsive flags, Davis will enter into a collaboration with nature, as his initial manipulation of the materials will be further subjected to the unpredictability of the weather and the forces of the wind. The resulting works will reflect and complicate some of the traditional functions of flags, such as protest, group identity affirmation, nationalism, and morale building during conflict.



Laumeier's Curator Dana Turkovic states: "Laumeier's Kranzberg Exhibition series is a great platform and opportunity for local and regional artists to create and present a new body of work. Vaughn's exhibition introduces a new perspective on traditional media as he pushes the boundaries of painting into sculpture. His ceramic work brings yet another craft into the conversation about sculpture, materials, and the artistic process."

Vaughn Davis Jr. received his BFA in 2017 from Webster University, St. Louis. His work has been exhibited at Craft Alliance, St. Louis; Philip Slein Gallery, St. Louis; Malin Gallery, New York; The Luminary, St. Louis; Gazebo Gallery, Kent, OH; among others. He has had solo exhibitions at Romer Young Gallery, San Francisco; Dragon Crab & Turtle, St. Louis and Monaco Gallery, St. Louis. Davis lives and works in St. Louis.
